



Guidelines for Preparing Your Presentation

Presentation Format

- Presentations will be organized into thematic groups of 4-5 presenters.
- Your individual presentation should not be longer than 10 minutes.
- Presenters may use the screensharing feature in Zoom if desired.
- If you plan to share your screen and have not done this in Zoom before, please watch this short tutorial video before your presentation day: <https://support.zoom.us/hc/en-us/articles/201362153-Sharing-your-screen-content-or-second-camera>.
- Presentations will be followed by a “Question and Answer” discussion with audience members and other presenters.

Presentation Content

- Your presentations should minimally have 5 components:
 - A **thesis statement** that highlights the main idea that your presentation will defend or explain
 - A brief statement about **method**, i.e., how you conducted the research. For example, did you conduct surveys, analyze texts, review published articles, etc.
 - **Supporting information** derived from your original research that either supports or refutes your thesis
 - A **conclusion** that summarizes what you found, how it connects to your thesis, and the global relevance or importance of your research
 - A list of **references**

We recommend discussing this with your faculty mentor while preparing your presentation to make sure all components are included.

- Please keep the **GIC audience** in mind when preparing your presentation; remember that GIC is a multidisciplinary conference that brings together people representing different academic fields, nationalities, and language!
